

Climate change, health and food security dynamics among women oyster harvesters in The Gambia, West Africa.

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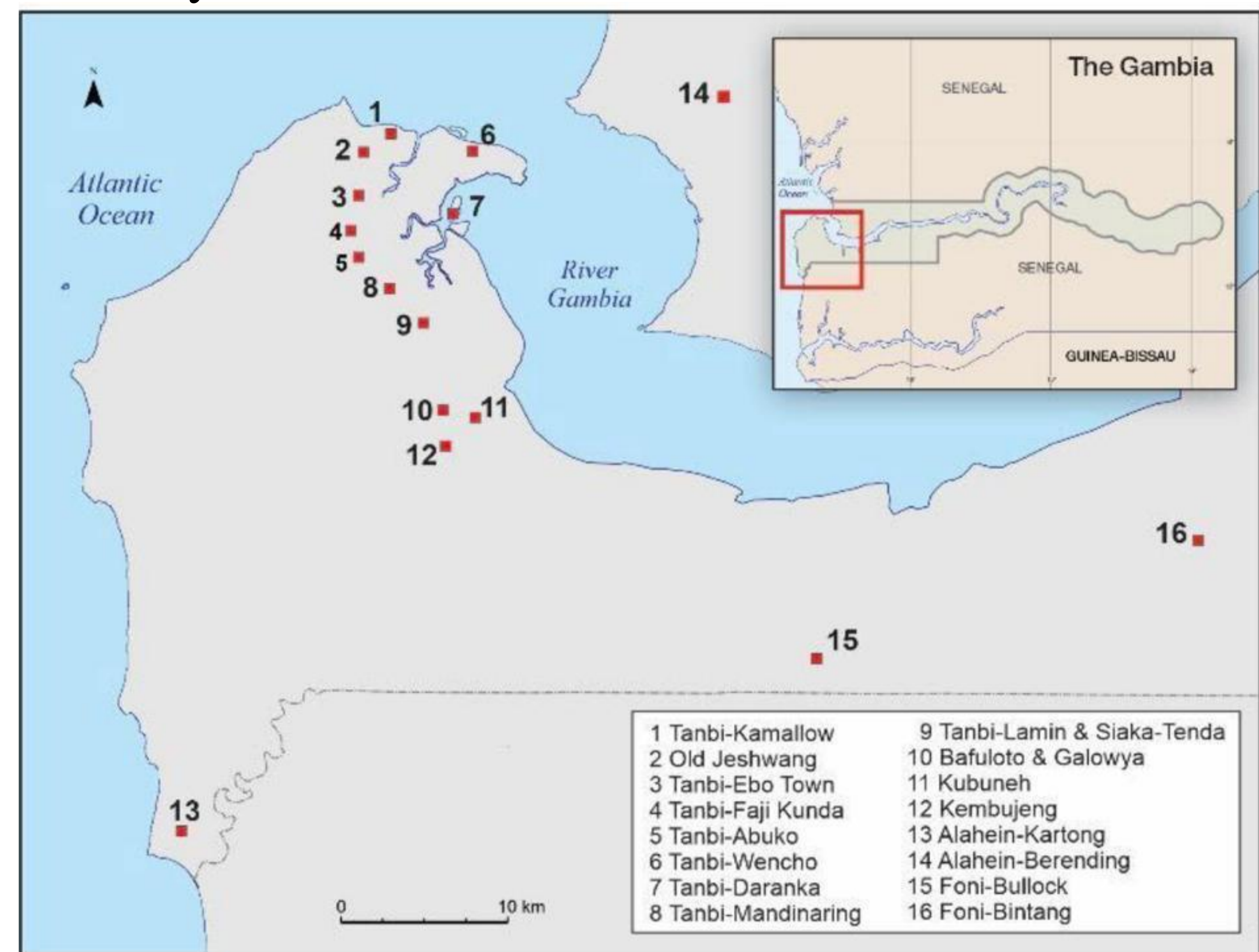
Introduction

- Women in small-scale fishing are witnessing increasing food and nutrition insecurity and declining income from fish-related activities due to escalating climate change threats.

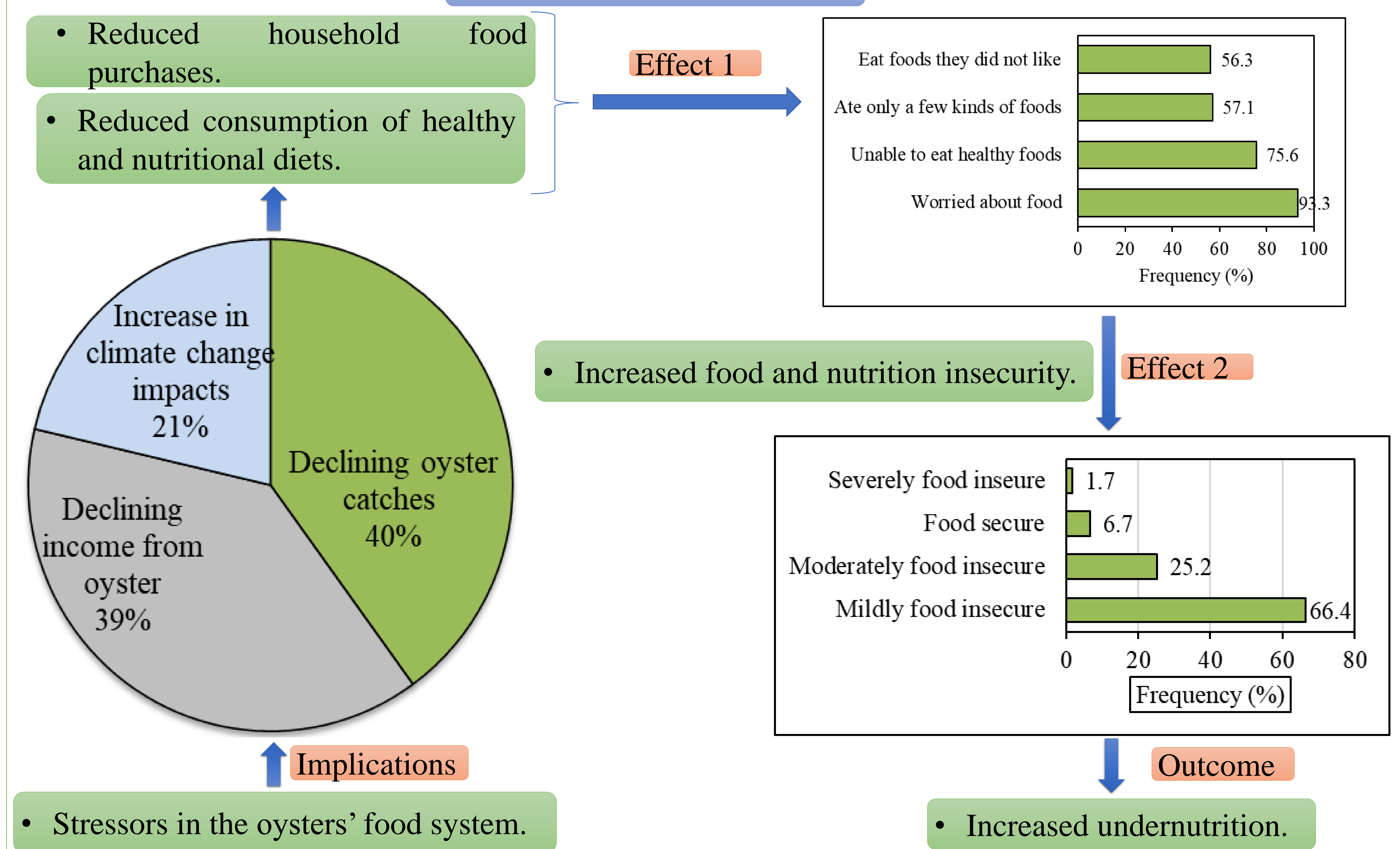


Method
